

THIRTEEN WAYS OF LOOKING

Introduce your students to the poem Thirteen Ways of Looking at a Blackbird by American Poet Wallace Stevens. In his poem Stevens uses thirteen short and separate sections that mention the blackbird in different ways.

Each section evokes a feeling where "the thirteen word-pictures are a whole study of identity and promote the idea that a creature seemingly simple, a common blackbird, is anything but, because at a given instant perception alters, depending on the physical environment, the action of the bird and the effect on the mind of the perceiver."

On your field trip, ask the students to pick an object from that place and consider thirteen ways to explore the identity of the object and place.

Review the images and discuss with your students how these objects capture a portrait of a place.
